Synopsis

Oliver is a struggling writer and poet who suffers from imposter syndrome as he struggles to complete his work. His paranoia builds over one night as he begins to suspect his doppelganger is stalking his with the intention of destroying his work. As Oliver's grip on reality deteriorates, he is forced to confront his deepest fears and insecurities, fighting to maintain his sense of self. **These Hands Are Not Mine** is a film about what is means to be an artist and the toll it takes on the mind.

Director's Statement

These Hands Are Not Mine is a personal project as it highlights the deep insecurities of artists that I myself have felt. The concept of imposter syndrome is very familiar to me, as I struggle to remove myself from my work and see it objectively. Rather, I am highly critical of my work as I try to get it the best it can possibly be.

I am proud of the ways we crafted this project in unison with the medium of film. Content is sculpted to its form in order to best convey its story. I am excited to use the different tools film has to offer, so I feel we used films various elements, sound, music, cinematography, performance, to tell a story that could only exist as a film.

Stylistically, I was always drawn to films that are ambiguous, mysterious, and open to interpretation. I have been influenced by psychological thrillers from directors such as David Fincher and Christopher Nolan as I too seek to create challenging films that people can watch multiple times and try to piece together.

This project displays the struggles of being an artist and is thus targeted towards other creative people who have experienced all the labours of expression. In the end, we need to use all the self doubt, insecurity, and paranoia in our art.

Telly Bitsakakis | Director, Producer, Cinematographer, Editor

Telly started making films at a young age, drawn to the ability to tell stories visually, and films capability to convey emotion. Throughout his teenage years he made countless short films and two feature films. He then studied cinema at the University of Toronto for four years, getting his bachelor's degree in fine arts. Afterward, he attended Vancouver Film School's Film Production program in 2019, graduating having directed the short film, Time Sheds No Tears.

Aliki Bitsakakis | Writer, Producer

Aliki has been writing since she could hold a pen. Following her creative childhood, Aliki earned her undergrad as an English major at the University of Toronto. Since then Aliki finished writing her debut novel, **Self Portrait**, and works with Telly writing and producing short films.

Kosta Athanasellis | Actor (Oliver)

Kosta started performing at a young age. In university, he studied theatre at York University in Toronto. Since then he has started in multiple short films and web series. He is also an active musician, model, and dancer.

Theo White | Composer, Sound Editor and Mixer

Theo is a Toronto based musician and music producer. He studied Music Production at Fanshawe College and aspires to compass scores for feature films. Projects he has worked on include the catalog of songs by City Builders, compositions for short films such as **Time Sheds No Tears**, and the producing and engineering songs for artists including Trevor Carter and FAOC.

Persephone Media | Production Company

In 2020, Telly and Aliki started a production company, Persephone Media. Since then, they have produced over a dozen music videos and many more corporate videos. Telly and Aliki's real passion lies in narrative filmmaking, and "These Hands are not Mine" marks their first short film since Telly returned to Toronto from Vancouver during the pandemic and the sibling due started working together full time.







FAQs

Q: What was your inspiration? What was the writing process like?

A: We were initially inspired by Jekyll and Hyde, and the idea of two extremes living within one person. Oliver, like any artist, suffers from imposter syndrome, and his insecurities manifest into a stronger, scarier version of himself.

Q: How did you approach including poetry in your film?
A: We built the story around the poetry. We started by attaching images to each line, visualizing how these duelling voices would appear on screen,

Q: Why does Oliver speak in poetic verse in his head?

A: Oliver is a writer and he is always writing. He cannot distance himself from his work, which is why his poetry flows through his mind. Also why he creates this doppel garger out of thin air

Q: Why does Oliver use a typewriter?

A: Oliver is the kind of tortured artists that needs to go totally bare bones in order to get the creative juices flowing. To get into the right creative state, he abandons all modern technology and is left alone with his thoughts.

Q: What do his hands represent in the film?

A: A lot of one's identity rests in the hands. In movies, when a character wakes up as a monster, they look down at their hands first. We thought this was even more heightened with Oliver, as what he creates also flows through his hands. We wanted to start Oliver's paranoia with the terrifying thought of waking up and not seeing your hands in front of you. It creates this deep distance between you and yourself, which breaks Oliver apart and starts the action of the film.

Q: What are you most proud of?

A: We are most proud of how all the different elements of the film come together to tell an ambiguous but clear narrative arc. Starting with a poem, we were always we nervous that the story would be too abstract to be understood by the audience, and we never wanted spoon feed the story. So taking risks like the poetic voice over and the silent and singular character ended up paying off in the end

Q: Who do you think can best relate to this film?

A: Any creative person who has felt they are not good enough can relate to this film. Even if you don't work in a creative industry, having negative feelings toward your work and your ability is universal. So if there's one thing that everyone can take away from this film it's that we are all our own worst critics and enemies.
